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What is Social Annotation

Taking annotations in the margins to the digital sphere

Social annotation is exactly what the name implies. It is a discursive practice in which readers can share their personal thoughts, opinions, and questions regarding specific content with other individuals or groups of individuals within a digital community. Thus, it can serve as an alternative (or complement) to standard class discussion posts. Social annotation enables students to interact with one another and with the instructor directly within a text, with the added benefit of allowing the instructor and/or students to direct and focus the conversation around the most pertinent attributes of that same content.


